

Boyup Brook District Pioneers Museum

Unique amongst the displays are

- ◆ The Masonic Temple which is the only one in WA (possibly Australia) that is complete with original furniture, symbols and regalia, and open to the public.
- ◆ A comprehensive display of machinery to do with clover industry, developed by PD Forrest
- ◆ The Kulikup one-room country school building with memorabilia 1917 - 1945
- ◆ The Mortuary building in which was in use at the Upper Blackwood Soldiers Memorial Hospital, 1924 - 1998, and now houses a display of early hospital equipment.

The Flax Mill site is a significant part of Boyup Brook's history as the production of ropes and webbing from flax grown in the district was an important industry in operation during World War II. Of all of the Flaxmills established through out Australia it is the only one largely still standing.

It has been developed as a recreation and accommodation precinct

Within the 'Office' building is housed scale models

- * of the Flax Mill in full production
 - * of 'Skeleton' (Skelly or Skellows) Railway Bridge

NORLUP HOMESTEAD

'Commander' Scott had the first convict-built brick home in the district, using the skills of one J. Smith (brick maker & layer), assigned to him. Evidence of the construction process including the saw-pit and brick making site can still be seen along with other historical matters of interest. J (John? or Jack?) Smith also built Jayes Homestead (not open to the public) and later Scotts Hotel (now Tavern) in Bridgetown.

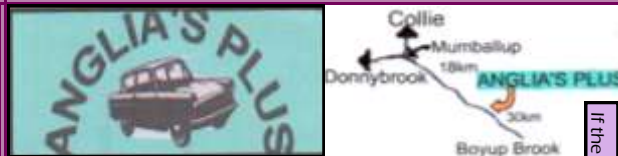
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
